GTV home prices continue to rise with high demand, low inventory


While COVID-19 casts a shadow of gloom, there's a bright spot for property owners here in Greentrees - the robust health of the local Florence housing market.

Back in 2012 the average sales price of homes in Greentrees was just \$67,500. For the 10 months ending October 31 of this year, 29 homes have sold here at an average sales price of \$183,600, and with a median of just 59 days on the market.

As this article was written in mid-Novem-

ber, there are just two active listings and nine pending in escrow. The demand is high. The supply is low. Greentrees is a hot market right now.

Unlike Florentine Estates and other Florence area neighborhoods, Greentrees offers the most diverse range of housing in the area.



Low inventory drives up home pices. The typical home in Greentrees sells within 60 days after it goes on the market, according to local realtor Stephen Earnshaw.

Homes in Greentrees range from pre-1976, single-wide mobile homes that are not eligible for conventional, FHA, or VA financing, to new(er), river-front double-wide manufactured homes that are easily financed.

Every year, the mix of homes sold varies considerably. Some years, more single-wides sell. Other years, see more double-wides sell.

Condition plays an important part in both values and how quickly a home here sells.

Homes that have been well maintained and updated command a higher price in the market, while homes in original condition with "deferred" maintenance will sell for less.

The typical Greentrees buyer is most interested in a "move-in-ready" home, while those described as "fixers" tend to languish on the market.

One of the best strategies before listing your home is to obtain a home inspection, and deciding if spending additional time and money will result in a selling price that exceeds the cost of said repairs and updating.

Most buyers will have an inspection contingency in their offer, and it's usually best to address the larger items such inspection reveals, i.e. roof, structural, plumbing, and electrical repairs, before going on the market.

Popular renovations include updated bathrooms and kitchens, window replacement, interior paint and vinyl plank flooring. Often, fresh paint and hardware on cabinets alsomake a big difference in a home's appeal.

Improving "curb appeal" by trimming back vegetation to bring in much desired natural light, also improves saleability.

The single best improvement you can make is to make the interior as light and bright as possible.

Greentrees will continue to be a high-demand neighborhood limited only by the lack of homes for sale.


Christmas Rummage Sale

Take Your Garage Sale "Online"

Is your garage so full you can't park your car inside? Perhaps it's time to purge. Sell what you no longer need, but do it "Online."

Tackling this can be daunting. Set aside an hour a day and focus on one area at a time. Ask yourself, "When was the last time I used this?" or "Will my kids want it someday?"

There are Online sales websites that charge a commission (eBay), monthly and/ or upfront fees. Some don't charge anything (Craigslist). There are specialty websites such as Poshmark for fashion and Etsy for crafts. To sell Online you will need to setup an account with the website you want to use.

The most popular, eBay, typically only charges if your item sells. It uses a safe, seller/buyer feedback system and secure monetary transactions.

One challenge with selling Online is the size and weight of an item. Sometimes the cost to ship to the buyer is more than the item is worth; heavy items, or a box with a measurement of more than 12 inches, gets expensive.

To determine the value and sales potential of an item, research itOnline. Go to eBay.com,

then search for the item you want to sell. (An account is not required to search.)

You can also Google your item. Type in the name or description, then click the "shopping" tab when the search engine pops up the findings.

Something you might throw away could be a collectable to someone else.

For example, recent items sold by the GTV Activity Committee via eBay include an old pencil sharpener (\$80), vintage/rusty wrenches (\$33) and dollhouse furniture (\$100).

The only way to know an item's worth is to do the research.

If you have reservations about Online selling, ask friends or neighbors for help. Many here in Greentrees sell items on eBay, Etsy and Craigslist.

A note of caution: Selling via Craigslist or Facebook, where sales are typically face-to-face, pose safety concerns. So, always have someone else there with you when meeting a potential buyer, whether it's at home or outsdie of Greentrees. ~Mark Tilchen

Ron's Firehouse

WAFFLES

One of my best friends. Ron Apling, a retired Eugene fireman/medic, is famous for the waffles he made for the crews at the firehouses where he worked. These golden treats are crunchy on the outside, soft on the inside.

- 1 cup flour
- 3 tsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1-3/4 cups milk or 1 pint buttermilk (best!)
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 2 egg yolks
- 3 egg whites

Mix the dry ingredients together in a bowl. Place milk, oil and egg yolks (save the whites!) into a larger, separate bowl.

Place the whites of three eggs in a third bowl. Use electric blender to whip them until the whites are stiff. Set whites aside.

Blend wet ingredients, then slowly add the dry ingredients until the waffle batter is smooth.

Use a large spoon to transfer the whipped egg whites to the waffle batter. SLOWLY fold the egg whites into the



batter. You want as much of the air in the egg whites to remain, which makes the crunchy exterior of the waffles.

Once the whites are folded into the batter, spoon the batter onto

oiled waffle iron. Lower the lid and wait until they are done to a golden brown.

You'll probably have to double the recipe if you are having a crew over for breakfast. ~ *Bruce Smith*
