The letter Elkhorn Electric sent to Greentrees homeowners is to inform each homeowner that preventative maintenance on their pedestals is much less costly than emergency services, which Elkhorn Electric has seen a lot of lately.

Greentrees is not endorsing any contractor and recommends you contact the electrician of your choice to have an inspection. Greentrees Village is not responsible for electrical services at our individual homes, nor the pedestal boxes that bring the electricity to our homes. Please do not contact our office staff regarding this.

Elkhorn is scheduling inspections. The cost of this inspection is \$120 and will include inspecting and lubricating your service. Please call Elkhorn Electric and schedule an appointment with Heather.

SPRING MAINTENANCE—ELECTRICAL **PEDESTALS**

A new maintenance routine should be added to each of our lists of annual spring maintenance for our homes. The electrical pedestal and meter is susceptible to corrosion due to moisture, heat, and cold. The pedestal is the sole responsibility of each homeowner. ANY work must be done by a qualified electrician who will get in touch with Central Lincoln PUD for coordination on the maintenance. when necessary. Maintenance should be planned ahead with a licensed electrician of your choice.

If left to fail as ours did, we learned the hard way, an Emergency response and replacement is extremely costly. All short electric meter pedestals are not the current building code. If the electric pedestal fails, the pedestal must be brought up to current code. Good luck and Happy Spring!

2nd ASSISTANCE FUND FOR GREEN-TREES RESIDENTS INCREASE IN DUES

An additional \$10,000 fund has been set up to help certain residents who are most in need of assistance with the increase in the annual HOA dues. This is a separate fund from the SOS fund created to help with HOA dues increases. Carley Scibetta will be managing the new fund and distributing the amounts in lump sums for each lot needing assistance. It will NOT be a lump sum of \$10,000 given directly to Greentrees. If you require assistance with the increased HOA fees, please contact Carley directly.

The difference between the two funds is one is being held at SOS for those homeowners who may need assistance for a month or two, but no more than six months. The other \$10,000 is being held by Carley and it will be used to pay the increase in dues for homeowners who cannot afford the monthly increase. The payout will be given as a lump sum of \$48 x the number of months needed by the individual. For example, if they only paid their January dues and need help for the remainder of the year, the amount paid will be $$48 \times 11 = 528 . If they have already paid their February bill, the amount will be for $$48 \times 10 = 480 .

Please spread the word to anyone who might benefit from this initiative. Also, if you know someone who would need assistance and might be resistant to applying for help, please feel free to pass a name along to Carley.

Greentrees Village Inc. has no involvement in distributing the funds, we only apply the funds paid to Greentrees for the appropriate lots. Please do not contact the office, but contact Carley Scibetta or SOS for more information

March is Flood awareness month, with a week dedicated to tsunami awareness.

In the past years GERT has participated in Tsunami Walk-Out drill with the City of Florence. This year, the GERT team will be performing their own tsunami walk-out drill in GTV. The city will not be participating in the exercise this year. The tsunami awareness week is the last week in March.

What can cause a tsunami? Tsunamis can be from earthquakes, underwater landslides, or underwater volcanic eruptions. Florence is in a tsunami zone. If we have a local earthquake or a distant earthquake we may be under a tsunami warning or watch.

If you are on the beach and hear the tsunami sirens, leave immediately and follow the evacuation route by getting out of the tsunami zone to higher ground.

The last Friday of every month at 11am, Florence tests the tsunami sirens.

PREPARING FOR THE UNEXPECTED AND INEVITABLE

Death is a topic many of us prefer to avoid, but taking the time to prepare for it is one of the most thoughtful and responsible gifts you can give to your loved ones. By organizing your affairs, you can ensure your wishes are honored, reduce stress for your family, and leave a legacy of clarity and care. Here's a guide to the essential steps you should take to be prepared.

- Make sure all bank accounts have direct beneficiaries. The beneficiary need only go to the bank with your death certificate and an ID of their own.
- TOD = Transfer On Death deed if you own a home. Completing this document and filing it with your county saves your heirs THOUSANDS. This document allows you to transfer ownership of your home to your designee. All they need to do is take their ID and your death certificate to the county building and the deed is signed over. Doing this will avoid the home having to go through probate. Living Will: Allows one to put in writing exactly what you want done in the event you cannot speak for yourself when it comes to healthcare decisions as well as other final decisions.
- Durable Power of Attorney: Allows one to designate a person to make legal decisions if you are no longer competent to do so.
- Power of Attorney for Healthcare: This document allows one to designate someone to make healthcare decisions for them.
- Last Will and Testament: Designates to whom personal belongings will go.
- Funeral Planning Declaration: Allows one to say exactly one's wishes as far as disposition of the body and the services.

If the above documents are done, you can AVOID probate.

If all the above is not done, you have to open an estate account at the bank. All money that doesn't have direct beneficiaries goes into this account. You have to have an attorney to open the estate account. The attorney also has to publicize your passing in the newspaper or post publication at the county courthouse, to allow anyone to make a claim on your property. It's a complete PAIN.

- Make a list of all banks and account numbers, all investment institutions with account numbers, lists of credit cards, utility accounts, etc. Leave clear instructions as to how and when these things are paid.
- Make sure heirs know where life insurance policies are located.
- Make 100% sure SOMEONE knows your Apple ID, bank ID account logins and passwords!
- Make sure you have titles for all vehicles, campers, etc!
- Set up a TRUST for intended beneficiaries, especially those that are too young, and appoint a trustee of said trust.

MOST IMPORTANTLY!!!! Talk with those closest to you and make all your wishes KNOWN. Talk to those whom you've designated, as well as those close to you whom you did not designate. Do this to explain why your decisions were made and to avoid any lingering questions or hurt feelings.

Hope this helps! Hope this lights a spark to encourage all your friends and family to take care of these things to make it easier for those we all leave behind!

My hope is that the above list at least helps you start an important conversation with your loved ones.

WESTERN LANE MOBILE CRISIS RESPONSE (WLCR) TEAM

On February 12, the Western Lane Mobile Crisis Response Team met with residents to outline their free, grant-funded services—no insurance, tax dollars, or payment required. Operating 24/7, including holidays, they offer mental health counseling and support for challenges like homelessness, food insecurity, alcohol and drug addiction, grief, and various social services, all customized to individual needs.

A central point they stressed is that they don't define a crisis. What feels overwhelming or unmanageable varies from person to person, and they respect that. Their mission is to deliver compassionate, professional assistance without judgment, providing resources tailored to each situation.

The team tackled a tough but vital topic: suicide and its prevention, a pressing concern in Florence, where seniors face an alarmingly high suicide rate. They identified common triggers for suicidal thoughts among older adults, such as grief from losing a spouse or close friends, physical disabilities that restrict independence, social isolation due to distant family or friends, and persistent depression. They encouraged breaking the silence around these struggles, emphasizing that seeking help carries no shame—it's a courageous step. If you or someone you know is hurting, they're ready to assist.


In emergencies, dial 911 and request the Crisis Response Team; they can arrive with police to calm volatile situations or alone if police aren't needed. For non-emergencies, call 541-997-3515. Beyond immediate aid, they offer aftercare, following up to ensure access to food, medical care, housing, or other support, promoting lasting stability.

Senior abuse is, unfortunately, all too common. It doesn't have to be physical abuse, but can also be emotional, mental, or financial abuse. It can be done by family, spouse, 'friends', and others. Do you know the signs of senior abuse? And if you witness it, do you know what to do and who to report it to?

Adult Protective Services will be doing a vital presentation for Greentrees on these important topics to educate us on these critical issues. They will be here on **March 11 at 2 PM** to do a presentation in the Rec Hall. They will give us the answers to the questions above and answer any questions you may have. Don't miss this important event—plan to attend and help protect our seniors.

Grief Counseling

Losing a loved one can be an incredibly isolating experience, often leaving those in grief feeling disconnected from the world around them. While joining a group may not be your initial instinct, a grief support group can offer immense comfort and understanding. Recognizing that grief is both a shared human experience and a deep personal journey can help alleviate some of the pain and guide you toward healing.

PeaceHealth offers two free support groups: men-only group meeting monthly, and an 8-week closed group for all adults who have experienced loss.

For men, grief can be particularly challenging. PeaceHealth's new men's grief group welcomes all men 18+; your loss need not be recent, or hospice related. Meetings are held the first Monday of each month, 1:00–2:30 PM, at the PeaceHealth 386 Admin Building (386 9th St), near the Primary Care Clinic and Memorial Garden. No registration is required, and trained bereavement professionals facilitate. Contact Christina Harkness at 541-997-3418 with questions. Join us!

For those interested in the 8-week closed group, please call to inquire about upcoming session dates. This group is open to all adults experiencing grief and provides a structured environment to support your healing journey. Additional details can be found in the flyer included in this issue. 



Dirty Dancing -- 1987: Baby (Jennifer Grey) is one listless summer away from the Peace Corps. Hoping to enjoy her youth while it lasts, she's disappointed when her summer plans deposit her at a sleepy resort in the Catskills with her parents. Her luck turns around, however, when the resort's dance instructor, Johnny (Patrick Swayze), enlists Baby as his new partner, and the two fall in love. Baby's father forbids her from seeing Johnny, but she's determined to help him perform the last big dance of the summer.

Dogville -- 2004: A barren soundstage is stylishly utilized to create a minimalist small-town setting in which a mysterious woman named Grace (Nicole Kidman) hides from the criminals who pursue her. The town is two-faced and offers to harbor Grace as long as she can make it worth their effort, so Grace works hard under the employ of various townspeople to win their favor. Tensions flare, however, and Grace's status as a helpless outsider provokes vicious contempt and abuse from the citizens of Dogville.

Don't Say A Word -- 2001: Ruthless crook Patrick Koster (Sean Bean) and his partner capture young Jessie Conrad (Skye McCole Bartusiak) and hold her for an unusual ransom. Koster wants Jessie's therapist father, Nathan (Michael Douglas), to somehow coax traumatized teen Elisabeth (Brittany Murphy) into divulging a mysterious code number that will lead the criminals to a hidden jewel worth a fortune. Unfortunately, it may be impossible to convince the delusional Elisabeth to cooperate: she hasn't spoken in 10 years.

Draft Day – 2014: Sonny Weaver Jr. is the general manager of the Cleveland Browns. One of pro football's most important days, NFL draft day, is drawing near, but Sonny has much more on his mind than just which players to recruit. His lover is pregnant, and the team's owner wants to fire him. After Sonny accepts a deal with Seattle that nets him that team's first-round pick, he immediately wonders if he has made the right choice for himself and the Browns.

Dreamer -- 2005: Ben Crane (Kurt Russell) is a horse trainer who is struggling to connect with his precocious daughter, Cale (Dakota Fanning). But then a horse by the name of Soñador suffers a broken leg after its evil owner (David Morse) races her despite Ben's advice. Rather than put his client's injured horse down, Ben adopts her and welcomes Cale into the family business. They train Soñador to race again as grouchy but kind-hearted Grandpa (Kris Kristofferson) lends his encouragement.

Eagle Eye -- 2008: Jerry Shaw (Shia LaBeouf) and Rachel Holloman (Michelle Monaghan) are two strangers whose lives are suddenly thrown into turmoil by a mysterious woman they have never met. Threatening their lives and family, the unseen caller uses everyday technology to control their actions and push them into increasing danger. As events escalate, Jerry and Rachel become the country's mostwanted fugitives and must figure out what is happening to them.


Ellen Foster –1997: In this TV movie set in the American South during the 1980s, 11-year-old Ellen (Jena Malone) enters a life of hardship after her mother's suicide. Fleeing her abusive father, she goes first to live with her bitter grandmother (Julie Harris) and then is shuttled to one strange household after another, always beset by new problems and difficulties but gaining strength and insight along the way. 

Lane County Welcomes Back #1 and #2 Plastics in Mixed Recycling

Beginning June 1, 2022: #1 and #2 bottles, jars, and jugs (if larger than a tennis ball) can be recycled in curbside containers or taken to ANY Lane County transfer station! Be sure to check the shape and number.



Recycle #1 and #2 plastic bottles, jugs and plastic jars.



- NO caps, lids, or pumps
- · NO butter, cottage cheese, or yogurt tubs
- · NO plastic bags
- · NO prescription bottles
- NO motor oil bottles or jugs
- NO plastics stamped with the numbers 3, 4, 5, 6, or 7

Recycling FAQs

Q. Why the change?

A. Since the global recycling market crisis, local material recovery facilities in the state have worked tirelessly to add additional machinery and advanced technology needed to sort and clean up the recycling stream. In the last several years, we've also seen domestic markets improve and more companies buying post-consumer resin made from recycled plastics.

Q. Do all plastics with a recycling number and symbol go in the mixed recycling? What about clamshell containers?

A. No. Clamshell containers are not allowed. Plastics #3 -7 are not allowed.

Q. What about plastic bags?

A. No. Plastic bags and plastic wrap can be recycled at participating retail stores. Visit **www.plasticfilmrecycling.org** for a location near you.

Q. Can I recycle pizza boxes?

A. YES! BUT...cardboard must be free of waxes or other finishes. Please remove food from box and place it with cardboard or mixed recycling.

Q. Why is contamination so bad?

A. Contamination is a big deal because it contributes to worker hazards, equipment damage, higher recycling costs, less efficiency, and lower quality. When it comes to recycling, **focus on quality, not quantity**.

Things to consider before joining a grief group:

While everyone responds to a death experience differently, grief that is expressed and shared within a supportive environment has the power to provide hope and healing. Peace Harbor Hospice offers curriculum-based, non-religious grief group, facilitated by our Bereavement Coordinator and held four times per year. We aim to nurture groups that are reciprocal in nature so members can feel comfortable sharing their experiences around grief and loss.

We encourage individuals to be at least 60-90 days out from their loss before joining a grief group.

This is to help prevent the re-traumatization that can occur from sharing the story of the loved one's death or from hearing others' stories of grief and loss too soon.

What is the benefit of attending?

- Connection with others who have gone through a similar situation
- · Association with people who will listen without judgment
- Time to focus on how the loss is affecting you
- · Resources to help you cope and move through grief in community
- Personal acceptance of your grief experience
- · Time to share memories of the person who died
- Understanding of common grief responses

How are grief groups structured?

- All groups are facilitated by hospice bereavement professionals and trained volunteers
 who help guide conversation, provide support and offer other grief and loss
 resources.
- Group size is limited to 8-10 participants and 2 facilitators.
- The same group members meet weekly for eight consecutive weeks. We strongly recommend that participants commit to attending all eight sessions.

 Materials build week-to-week, and foster continuity and connection.

How to register or ask questions: Space is limited and pre-registration is required. For further group information and/or registration please call 541-997-3418 x 5830.
