

New Building and Pool Hours—January 1, 2026

Beginning January 1, the building will be open from 8 AM to 9 PM, and the pool will be open from 8 AM to 8:30 PM.

The pool will close whenever the outside temperature is 40°F or below and will reopen once the temperature reaches 42°F. When the pool is closed due to cold weather, the Spa and Sauna will remain open since they are indoors.

Maintenance will post an Open/Closed flag at the pool, and a thermometer will be placed outside near the pool for easy reference.

Outgoing President's Message

As it currently stands, meaningful volunteer leadership cannot exist in this kind of environment, and it has become unsafe for me to continue to serve as President. No one deserves the level of hostility I have experienced, and it cannot continue if we expect people to step up and serve in the way this community deserves.

CC&R and Bylaws Meetings - Unedited at the request of the author

The CC&Rs and Bylaws Committee held at town hall on Jan. 10 to hear residents thoughts about the new law regarding ADUs. We received some good feedback from everyone in attendance. We also handed out the City of Florence rules regarding ADUs. ADUs must adhere to the City rules as well as any that are implemented through our CC&Rs.

The committee continues to make good progress. We expect to submit the revised CC&Rs to our HOA attorney for review by the end of February. We want him to review it before releasing it to the homeowners. There are some clarifications needed, and we have made some suggested changes including deleting and adding articles or portions of some. We want to ensure these are all correct prior to the homeowner's review.

Once we have completed the CC&Rs review, while the attorney is reviewing our changes, we will begin on the Bylaws. Again, these will go to the attorney prior to release to the homeowners.

We will continue to have town halls to address questions and ensure the homeowners are aware of what we are considering.

I am also part of WLEOG & WLECN, representing GTV. Jay and I enjoy time with family, friends, and our pets. Some of our favorite pastimes include walks on the beach with our dog, hiking, biking, and spending time together.

Property Committee Chair—Tom Shaw As an architect of 36 years, I have had the opportunity to design a variety of new buildings ranging from a food processing facility, a beach front destination restaurant, and many industrial buildings. But what has been personally exhilarating is the recycling of society's discarded buildings and repositioning them into new uses like; an insurance claim center into an Elks club, a historical 1902 apartment building into a mixed-use restaurant/attorney office complex, and a 1930's defunct beach hotel into a retirement facility. As co-chair of the Property Committee, the technical issues of dealing with an antiquated infrastructure present many of the same challenges.

Property Committee Co-Chair—Jack Stephen As Co-Chair of the GTV Properties Committee, Jack Stephen brings hands-on experience, technical insight, and a strong commitment to responsible asset management. He researches Reserve Study items, evaluates replacement costs, and identifies qualified vendors. Jack advises on aging systems, reviews ADA standards, analyzes maintenance needs, and assesses useful life projections for community assets. He contributes to traffic-related research, investigates concealed conditions, and recommends replacements for key Recreation Room equipment. Jack also documents emergency pipe breaks and newly discovered infrastructure issues to support Board workshops. His practical knowledge of product longevity and preventative schedules strengthens the committee's planning and ensures well-informed decisions for Greentrees Village.

New Position for Board Meetings—Parliamentarian

The 2026 Board has approved the addition of a Parliamentarian to support Board meetings. Under Robert's Rules of Order, a Parliamentarian advises the presiding officer on points of order, parliamentary questions, and proper meeting procedure. This role is advisory only.

At Greentrees Village, the Parliamentarian will:

- Guide the President on parliamentary procedure, especially complex items
- Assist with motions, points of order, and meeting processes
- Help keep meetings focused, orderly, and efficient
- Support respectful communication and help resolve disputes

If needed, the Parliamentarian may also serve as Sergeant at Arms, responsible for maintaining decorum, addressing disruptions such as excessive talking or cell phone use, and taking action at the direction of the President unless an immediate threat requires intervention.

The Parliamentarian will sit to the left of the audience, as viewed from the Board tables. During executive sessions, they will remain outside the Multipurpose Room. They will attend all regular, special, and emergency Board meetings.

Parliamentarian—Will von Dauster Will retired from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric and Atmospheric Administration in 2017. He then worked 7-1/2 years in the Emergency Department at French Hospital in San Luis Obispo, California. He is a former Irving, Texas police officer, software engineer, member and past president of several boards of directors, and was head of security at Congregation Beth David, San Luis Obispo, until moving to Greentrees Village in December, 2024. He is a current Florence Auxiliary Police Officer.

ADUs: An Opposing Opinion Based on Fact

The Ad Hoc CC&Rs and Bylaws Committee has discussed penalizing owners for building ADUs, but Oregon's HB 2138 (2025) limits HOA authority to do so. Effective January 1, 2027, any HOA governing documents that prohibit or restrict ADUs are void, no matter when the CC&Rs were recorded. The law also bans regulations that impose "unreasonable cost or delay," including extra fees, traffic studies, or additional parking requirements for an ADU. HOAs may enforce only objective design standards and necessary fire and safety rules. Beginning in 2027, HOAs also cannot ban ADU rentals, though they may adopt a rental cap of at least 25% and require long-term rentals. These facts come directly from my research into HB 2138.

Understanding the Review of Rule 16

Many residents have asked why Rule 16, our community's harassment and nuisance rule, is currently under review. We want to offer a simple explanation of what this process involves—and what it does *not* change about daily life in Greentrees Village.

Why the Rule Is Being Reviewed: Last year's revision of Rule 16 was rescinded so the community could take a fresh, balanced look at the rule. An Ad Hoc Committee was formed with members representing both sides of the issue. The committee includes co-chairs and members. The goal is to ensure Rule 16 is clear, fair, consistent, equitable, and easy to understand.

This rule update is not about restricting anyone's ability to speak, disagree, or express opinions. The proposed rule updates promote courteous and respectful behavior between residents, while respecting everyone's right to free speech.

How the Community Is Involved: Resident input has guided this process through town halls, surveys, written comments, and examples of behavior people believe should or should not fall under Rule 16. Your participation has helped shape a rule that reflects the values of our community.

What Happens Next: The committee will present proposed Rules 15 and 16 to the Board for a vote at the February board meeting. A workshop will be held the week before to review the proposals and answer Board questions.

Our goal is simple: a rule that protects residents, supports respectful community life, and avoids overreach.

Thank you for your engagement and for helping make Greentrees Village a safe, welcoming place for everyone.

Greentrees Emergency Response Team (GERT)

Being prepared is proven to help with the stress of an emergency situation or disaster. The best way to be prepared for a disaster is to have what makes you comfortable. Food is a comfort, so select comfort foods that you like, and need little to no water or heat. The simpler the better. Many people make the big mistake of having only dehydrated or military type rations for their emergency meals. If it's nasty now, it will be nasty during an emergency!

Storing foods you like makes rotating and using your food seamless with little to no waste. Purchase what you like to eat. February is National Canned Food Month. Rotate through your supplies this month, and don't forget to have a can opener with your cans.

There are many good options available for dehydrated food as well. Years back, GERT did blind taste tests with several of the leading brands. The brands that always win for taste and less sodium are Mountain House and Wise Foods. Augason Farms is the most economical and doesn't skimp on flavor either. Coleman is inexpensive as well, but seemed a bit salty for most tastes.

With spring camping near, there will be lots of sales on dehydrated foods, Bi-Mart carries a good selection and great sale prices.

Don't forget water, water, and more water to have in your emergency food. The average person needs a gallon of water per day to survive. And always include food and water for your pets. For average size pets, figure one quart of water per day.

Check out the GERT bulletin board for how to build up your emergency food supplies in 12 weeks, along with many other tips.

Activities Committee



Pea Pickin Cake

Pea pickin cake is a light and refreshing Southern sheet cake made with mandarin oranges, pineapple, and a fluffy whipped topping frosting — perfect for potlucks, holidays, or summer gatherings.

Prep time: 15 min Cook time: 30 min

Chill time: 1 hour

Ingredients

For the cake:

- 15.25 oz box butter cake mix
- 15 oz can mandarin oranges drained (set aside 2 tablespoons juice)
- 3 large eggs
- 1/2 cup unsalted butter melted

For the frosting:

- 3.4 oz box instant vanilla pudding
- 20 oz can crushed pineapple, including juice
- 16 oz whipped topping (2 tubs of Cool Whip)

Instructions

1. Preheat your oven to 325 F. Prepare a 9x13 inch metal baking pan with nonstick cooking spray or parchment paper and set aside.
2. In a large mixing bowl, combine the cake mix, eggs, butter, mandarin oranges, and the 2 tablespoons of juice. Use a hand mixer on low speed to mix the batter just until smooth, about 1-2 minutes. Avoid overmixing to prevent cake from becoming rubbery.
3. Pour the batter evenly into the prepared pan. Smooth the top with a spatula.
4. Bake on the center rack for 30-45 minutes. Check for doneness around 25-minute mark by inserting a cake tester or toothpick into the center, it should come out clean or with just a few crumbs. Tent with foil for the last 5-10 minutes if the top starts to brown too quickly.
5. Allow the cake to cool completely in the pan on a wire rack before frosting.
6. To make the frosting, in a medium bowl, combine instant vanilla pudding and crushed pineapple, including the juice. Once combined, add whipped topping and fold gently until thoroughly combined.
7. Spread the frosting evenly over the cooled cake. Chill the frosted cake in the refrigerator for at least 1 hour before serving. For best results, allow it to chill for 3-4 hours or overnight, so the frosting sets properly and the flavors can meld. Keep it covered with a lid or plastic wrap while chilling.
8. If desired, top with slices of more mandarin oranges.

Making Local Transportation Work

With Greentrees as our second home, we have often pondered how to make travel easier from our San Diego home. The 1,000 mile drive each way (through Los Angeles) is not our favorite! I was aware of the LinkLane service to Eugene, but that only goes to the Amtrak station, not the Eugene airport.

After studying schedules and online maps (connection always a few minutes off – the local bus leaves for the airport 5 minutes before LinkLane arrives!) I made a phone call and discovered a new option. There's a FREE service called 99Vine* which runs between McMinnville and Eugene four times a day - stops include Eugene airport (EUG), Junction City and Corvallis. The midday connection is 5 minutes after the LinkLane pulls in – actually feasible!

For our trial run we opted for the earliest LinkLane out of Florence, giving us four hours to spare. So, we had about 1-1/2 hours in Eugene. Sure enough, the 99Vine bus arrived before noon, and we were at EUG by 12:45. Time for a leisurely lunch at the airport and some reading before our afternoon flight.

Cost: \$10 for both of us, Florence to EUG. San Diego: 2-mile cab ride to our house was \$30.

Thank you to Oregon for making transportation reasonable!

Caveats: No Rhody Express before the first LinkLane to Eugene, so you need a friend or cab to Grocery Outlet by 9:15 AM. Always check the latest schedules for all routes and holiday schedules!

Book Review

A is for Alibi (1982), the first book in Sue Grafton's "Alphabet Series," introduces us to Kinsey Millhone, a "hard boiled" private investigator operating in an imaginary Santa Teresa (remarkably like the real Santa Barbara). Her "bread and butter" job is investigating insurance claims, but she takes clients, especially those that other PIs will not. In "A is for Alibi," a wealthy woman recently paroled from prison for murdering her husband, hires Millhone to prove her innocence. Apart from being 8 years old, the case is challenging since Millhone's client certainly seems guilty. Millhone uses a methodical approach similar to a police procedural and discovers a range of motives and complicated history. The plot includes travel to such places as Las Vegas and the Salton Sea.

The story has lots of secondary characters, but it has a "single plot" structure. The main character is interesting, but not exactly lovable. Two vague sex scenes, some profanity, and a very 1970s world view (e.g., fat-phobia, intended for comic relief). Unsurprisingly for a murder mystery, the story includes a range of violence, albeit without graphic detail. The story is notable for introducing one of the early "strong women characters"; unlike many stories with female protagonists, descriptions focus on environment, not on the main character's appearance or sartorial preferences. The story has occasional sexual tension but avoids romantic subplots.


