Greentrees Board Elections

Ballots are on the way for District Representatives and Alternates for the 2026-2027 term. District Representatives, who shall serve on the Board of Directors, are elected for a two-year term. Successful candidates will be seated at the January 20, 2026, meeting of the Board of Directors. Alternates, who may be appointed to the Board of Directors, are elected for a one-year term, assuming a seat on the board when a vacancy occurs and as our Bylaws prescribe.

Up for election are District Representatives for Districts 1, 3, 5, 7, and 9. Four Alternates from the community will also be elected. Your candidates are:

Thanksgiving

Every agricultural society has a Thanksgiving festival, sometimes celebrating a specific harvest but generally giving thanks for not just a successful harvest but for blessings and mercies throughout the year.

The Celts had two harvest festivals, one, Lugnasa, at the start of the harvest (celebrated in August) for "first fruits" and one celebrated at the end of harvest: Samhain, the main basis for our Hallowe'en. I'm not sure if they just really liked festivals or if the first festival was hedging their bets in case the full harvest was not as good as hoped.

Obviously, harvests happen at different times based on climate. This is why the English Thanksgiving happens on the Sunday closest to the Harvest Moon (so, late August or early September), Canadian Thanksgiving is observed in the middle of October, while the U.S. festival occurs at the end of November.

Not all Thanksgiving festivals are, strictly speaking, harvest festivals. The most popular and elaborate Thanksgiving festival in Africa is Irreecha, which the Oromo people in Ethiopia celebrate at the start of Spring, usually around various sacred lakes, to thank God for blessings and mercies in the previous year.

American Thanksgiving shares traditions with those of many other cultures. Feasting is the primary similarity, whether that is roast turkey, tofurky, or a fancy tourtiere (meat and potatoes pie). The Scots enjoy Skirlie, which, not surprisingly, features oats. As for watching football, many Thanksgiving traditions involve sports competitions, though usually playing, not watching, sports.

Opinion—Siuslaw High School

Today I attended two informational forums discussing the need for a new high school for the Florence school district. One meeting included a tour of our current establishment. The following is what I gleaned from the gatherings:

YES to answer your first concern: It will cost Florence taxpayers money. The good news is that all past bonds are paid off so this bond would not add to money already owed.

Siuslaw High School is 50+ years old (started use in 1970).

You would think it would last longer than that. It hasn't! Since 1970, Florence's population has grown (more students attend than the school was built for), the building does not meet updated requirements (even though attempts have been made to update as much as they can), and to me, the school was so poorly designed as far as student safety. There are 17 entrance/exits which cannot currently be monitored at the same time.



A tour of the facility is encouraged by Mr Mike Harklerode (Mr "H" to the students). You will see some great classrooms. You will also see some crowded ones. There are damaged restrooms and main floors with over 50 years of gum that have been pressed into the floors that can't be removed without great expense. Science classes can't offer a full spectrum of experiments because propane can no longer be piped into the classrooms. There is no area large enough to have assemblies (FEC must be rented in order to have school events). There is not a cafeteria. There are classrooms not available for use because the ventilation cannot be controlled.

Our great teaching staff need to have a good working environment. We need to have more professionals "want" to live in Florence. It can start with our schools.

It is worth your time to take a tour or attend an information discussion. It is a great opportunity to add your opinion to the decision making. Call the high school and get a chance to see for yourself. Make an informed decision and please keep in mind, these remarks I have shared with you are what I observed. What is your opinion?

Greentrees Emergency Response Team (GERT)

In November when the clocks are set back, remember to change the batteries in your smoke detectors. Test any wired smoke detectors monthly.

This is also a great time to rotate your emergency food supply and replace it with fresh supplies. When rotating your bottled water (stores for up to 10 years if sealed properly), do not shake, but roll your water bottles to keep them fresh and redistribute sediment. Rolling gently mixes the water without introducing extra air bubbles, which could trap oxygen and speed up bacterial growth or oxidation.

Sunshine and Vitamin D

Quilt Group Donations

Earlier this year, GTV resident Mardi Wetmore donated 54 hand-appliqued, beautiful quilt blocks to the Quilt Group. She asked that we create a wall hanging of a few for the office to beautify the place. The remaining blocks will be used to create some lap quilts or wall hangings to be sold at the group's quilt show in December.

The group created a wall hanging that measures about 31" x 35". This was a group effort: Diana Lindsley assembled and quilted the wall hanging; Nancy Cook donated fabric for the back and borders; Debbie Guttery donated the quilt hanger. The quilt is now brightening up the office space.

The Quilt Group has taken on another charity. They generally make quilts for the children of Florence, donated through the Giving Tree. This year, they decided to add on the Friends of Florence as a charitable group for donations. On October 17, the group donated 18 Christmas quilts to Linda Adcox of the Friends of Florence (also referred to as "the cancer bus"). The Friends of Florence transport patients from Florence to Eugene for cancer treatments, at no charge. Patients are often cold from the treatments and uncomfortable. The quilts provided will provide some comfort and warmth to them as they make the trip back and forth. After their treatment is over, the patients get to keep the quilts.

Ted Kooser had his "day job" with an insurance company, but also wrote poems, publishing many books, which are still available. He was the Poet Laureate of Congress from 2004 to 2006, the only poet appointed to that position from rural Midwest America.

Born in 1939 he is still with us and living in Garland NE. More can be discovered about his works online.

In the autumn of 1998, recovering from cancer treatment Ted took daily two mile walks before dawn (to avoid sunshine). At home he then wrote poems about what he saw. These were eventually published as "Early Morning Walks: one hundred postcards to Jim Harrison". Below are four of these poems.



FANTASY....

Brave -- 2012: Merida (Kelly Macdonald), the impetuous but courageous daughter of Scottish King Fergus (Billy Connolly) and Queen Elinor (Emma Thompson), is a skilled archer who wants to carve out her own path in life. Her defiance of an age-old tradition angers the Highland lords and leads to chaos in the kingdom. Merida seeks help from an eccentric witch (Julie Walters), who grants her an ill-fated wish. Now, Merida must discover the true meaning of courage and undo a beastly curse before it's too late.

Bridge to Terabithia -- 2007: The life of Jesse (Josh Hutcherson), an adolescent, changes when he befriends Leslie (AnnaSophia Robb), the class outsider. The children create an imaginary world called Terabithia, which is inhabited by all manner of magical creatures. Though difficulties fill their ordinary lives, Jesse and Leslie rule as king and queen in Terabithia. Soon one of the friends must draw on the strength of their imaginary kingdom to cope with a tragedy.


